Cold weather means cuddling up with a warm blanket and a good book. Students are a few months into the program, so try and keep excitement going by celebrating their accomplishments.

IBOB Practice Battle Tips:

-Have students watch a battle. On the IBOB website, there is a <u>video</u> that walks through it.

-Physically set up an area with two teams on either side and a judge chair or table in the middle. Students can sit on chairs, use desks, or long tables.

-Print out the set of questions you will be using and skim over the questions to be familiar with them and the wording.

-Use a phone as the timer- set it for 15 seconds and after you have read the question, hit the button.

-Oftentimes you may have to be the moderator, timer and point keeper. Printing the questions and marking down points helps if you don't want to put points on a whiteboard or chalkboard.

-Finding a staff member or student helper to run the timer is a benefit, so you can focus on the teams.

-Have teams make a little placard with their team name on it so when you ask questions, you can say the team name and then the question.

-Practice a few battles with each team before you start counting points. 15 seconds can feel like an eternity if no one knows the answer. It also helps them learn how to communicate with each other and the spokesperson. -The spokesperson can rotate each battle to give all students a chance who want to be the spokesperson.


The biggest thing to remember is you have the power to run the program how it works for your students and your school. You get to decide when battles happen, how they happen, how teams advance, and if teams will go to a regional tournament or it is just an in-school program.

The battles are the fun part! Enjoy!


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
